#### **Purpose**

Your resume can be a challenging document to start. This worksheet will help you keep track of the experiences you've gained that show employers you're qualified for the job. This will also help you start thinking about how you can show the skills employers are seeking

#### What matters most

Most students know employers and graduate schools evaluate candidates based on their experiences. What many students don't know is these experiences don't have to be paid or even directly related to the job or discipline. Below are skills that employers want to see in a candidate.
