1. This site has hosted appearances by Bob Dylan, the Dalai Lama, Stephen Hawking and President George W. Bush. Situated on the Northern edge of campus and adjacent to Merlo Field and Joe Etzel Field, it is the home of Pilot basketball and volleyball.
2. A 95-foot-tall brick structure located at a central crossroads on the university's campus. Built in 2008–09 this site features a cross and anchor atop its peak and houses 14 bronze bells specially cast in Holland.
3. Located between the Clark Library and Buckley Center, among a stand of towering sequoias, with a chapel-like space beneath them, is a white obelisk printed with the words “May Peace Prevail on Earth” in eight different languages.
4. The intellectual commons of the University, this space offers both a welcoming physical space and a robust virtual presence. Many students consider this space a second home where they can study, collaborate, and recharge in a comfortable quiet environment.
5. A popular student hub, dining hall, and social space. Often considered the campus "living room," it functions as a relaxed bar-and-grill, lounge area and campus bookstore.
6. This fitness and campus-life hub opened in 2015 and is named after a former university president. It offers modern recreation and wellness amenities.
7. Created by sculptor Donovan Peterson, this outdoor bronze and stone installation commemorates the late Reverend Thomas C. Oddo, a Holy Cross priest and university president who passed away in 1989.
8. Head to the beat of the drums and behind where you might find a Gorilla on the roof, you will stumble across the spot of competition among many looking to practice their free-throws. This spot not only serves as a casual gathering spot for students but is a venue for traditional campus events like the annual Halloween costume dance.
9. Where once stood the old P-Plant building, is now a modern and creative engineering space that rounds out your learning experience overlooking the Willamette River. Opened in 2024, the building was made possible in part by a gift in memory of the co-inventor of the Bjork-Shiley heart valve.
10. Overlooking the Bluff, this is a great place to share stories from your past weekend with friends, spend some quiet moments by the fireplace, or make plans for your future while enjoying multiple cuisine options from pizza, salad or the international flavor of the week.
